What are you going to do?



Update on Haiti

On August 14th the southern peninsula of Haiti was rocked with a devastating 7.2 earthquake leaving the area devastated. We have heard from one of our partner priests in Mirebalais that although the quake was felt in the area (which is roughly 125 miles from the epicenter and is located on the Central Plateau) he knows of no injuries and only minimal structural damage. He asks for our prayers for the people of Haiti.

On Sunday, August 22, 2021, in an email from Dr. Michelson Padovany, a cross-site surgical coordinator with Partners in Health (Zanmi Lasanti as it is known in Haiti) stated, "he saw suffering families, collapsed buildings, and debris-filled roads everywhere he went on the country's southern peninsula, and said help is direly needed......"You can tell that people are suffering from Les Cayes to Jeremie," he said. "You can see that every single building collapsed. I think what we need now is help for our people. We need help for children, help for adults, help for families. They need water. They need food. They need somewhere to stay at night."

International news reports Friday reported more than 2,100 killed and 12,000 injured, with both numbers still rising. The earthquake destroyed more than 50,000 homes and damaged nearly 80,000 more, leaving tens of thousands of people displaced or without homes.

Another doctor involved in the response cited widespread structural damage, including to health centers. Most health care centers in that region were destroyed or heavily damaged.

"So, if I have one message to the world. it is: We need your help."

Padovany continues, "University Hospital in Mirebalais is a vital center of care for patients affected by last weekend's disaster, reflecting the crucial importance of health system strengthening and the vital difference that world-class facilities and resources can make during a crisis.

Padovany said Tropical Storm Grace, which struck Haiti two days after the earthquake, has compounded the destruction and challenged relief efforts in the region.
